From Pastor Kathryn...

My dear siblings in Christ,

Lent is upon us once more, and perhaps we find ourselves wondering what we will "give up" or what discipline we will take up for the season. The question I want to encourage you to ask this year is: "Why will I do this thing? What do I hope to get out of it?"

Giving up chocolate or cutting out caffeine or committing to an exercise routine all may be good Lenten disciplines. But they might just be ways we use Lent as an excuse to do things we think will make us feel better or be better people.

Lent is not about being better, nor is it about self-improvement schemes. But what Lent can be about is remembering whose we are already and that we are already, as Children of God, declared "good" with all of God's creation.

As we enter into a season of discipline, of fasting or prayer or alms giving, consider how these practices and their many variations can be helpful to you, not to make yourself better, but to draw yourself closer into relationship with God, and to see more clearly your membership in the Body of Christ and your inherent worth and relatedness to all your siblings within the Body.

I pray that this Lenten season is one of discovery and growth, that we might at the end of it all find ourselves blooming along with the lilies of Easter Sunday.

Another note from Pastor Kathryn...

It is with great joy that I share with you our newly and unanimously adopted Identity Statement from our annual congregational meeting:

HTLC is a sacramental community of disciples of Jesus the Christ.

Having been blessed with gifts of the Spirit, and seeking God's guidance through prayer and worship, we will use these gifts to share the good news of God's unconditional love and respond to the needs of all in our community and in the world.

Rejoicing in the gifts we have been given, we will joyfully give as we have received.

We recognize and celebrate the great variety present in God's Good Creation and look for ways to be as open, affirming, and honoring of the many different ways God's children are created to be God's image in the world:

all races, all gender identities, all sexual orientations, all languages, all backgrounds, all futures, all economic statuses, all citizenships. All of God's Children.

Come as you are, and join us!

Adopting this statement has allowed us to become accepted into the Reconciling in Christ partnership with ReconcilingWorks, a national independent Lutheran organization that works to foster and support inclusive faith practices for the sake of the Gospel. This is an exciting step forward in our discernment as a congregation of who we have been made as a community in Christ and how we are being called to serve God and neighbor. Being Reconciling in Christ (or RIC) allows folks to find us on the RIC database if they are looking for a worshipping community but unsure of how they will be welcomed. With this RIC designation, now folks can know before meeting us that we are welcoming to ALL of God's children and our siblings in Christ!

In addition to the new Identity Statement, we also adopted seven core values:

SACRAMENTAL	COMMUNITY	DISCIPLESHIP	PRAYERFUL
DIVERSITY	STEWARDSHIP	MUSIC	

In the coming year, we will gather once a month after worship for some time of fellowship, food, and exploration of one of these values so that we can dig deeper and more clearly articulate what it is about these words and ideas that we hold so dear. I hope that you can join us for these events: March 15, April 19, May 17, June 14, July 19, August 16, and September 20.

LENT

Lent is a 40 day season beginning on Ash Wednesday extending to Holy Week that leads us to the cross of Jesus' crucifixion. It is the time when we hear Jesus' words, "if any want to become my followers, let them deny

themselves and take up their



cross and follow me." In the early church, lent was the final intense period of baptismal preparation before baptism at Easter.

Ash Wednesday - February 26th

We begin by remembering that we are dust, and to dust we shall return.

Around the scripture we will gather for a service of evening prayer.

STEWARDING GOD'S RESOURCES

Stewardship for Lent & Easter

Jesus teaches, "What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul?" -Mark 8:36, 37 (NIV)

Instead of the superficial "How's it going?" a wise colleague asks friends, "How is your soul?" The question requires effort. To answer it I must plunge deep inside – below the constantly churning waters of everyday joys, hopes, ambitions, desires, anxieties and disappointments. These are so strong, especially our desires and ambitions, that if we are not careful they can absorb all our time and energy.

Jesus repeatedly warns us not to let our desires and our worries overwhelm us, keeping us from paying attention to the soul. Our soul is where we connect with God, the source of our greatest strength and truest identity. Without attention, our soul can wither like a plant without water. As with all the treasures God has given us, we must be stewards of our souls.

The mystics of old and modern prophets (such as Richard Rohr, Marjorie Thompson, and Howard Thurman) teach us to employ prayer, holy silence, and other spiritual disciplines to tend our souls and keep worldly worries and desires from drowning us. This month, begin a daily practice of caring for

your soul. You might begin with five minutes of spoken prayer followed by five minutes of silence. Or reflect deeply on a Scripture passage. Or try prayerful yoga. (Your pastor might be able to give you some resources or ideas.)

With a little practice and attention, you can become stronger, more centered, and more spiritually resilient.
