From Pastor Irwin...

Advent Begins...

Doesn't it feel like we just did this? Didn't we just finish up with our last Advent and Christmas? What kind of merry-go-round is this church year cycle!? It's so easy to fall into the pattern of the liturgical seasons with a sense of dread, or banality, or unending work. It's so easy to try to just ignore the repetitive passage of time because it reminds us all too often not of what's beginning, but what we didn't get a chance to finish.

And yet.

This summer we ended up having to take two cars on our vacation. We split the kids, and I ended up with our oldest and youngest in the car with me. The youngest, having just turned one and still madly in love with naps, slept for most of the two-hour ride. Our oldest, at seven and a half, is much less enamored with sleep that accompanies sunlight, and so he and I were able to enjoy some rare time of one-on-one conversation and entertainment. About half an hour into the trip, I had the then-seemingly-brilliant idea of teaching him a circular song: "My name is Jack Johnson, I live in Wisconsin, I work in the lumber yards there (clap, clap) As I walk down the street all the folks that I meet say, 'What's your name?' And I tells 'em..." It is, to quote another such song, a song that never ends (yes, it goes on and on, my friends!). I taught it to him, line by line, then we sang it together for a while, then he kept going on his own. And going, and going...

I may have come to regret my "fun idea" shortly before we arrived at our destination.

But for my child, who had just learned not only this particular song, but the very fact that such repetitive songs existed, was transfixed by it, and thoroughly entertained, and also inspired to see how he could modify it while still keeping the circular nature of the lyrics. While I had grown tired of hearing the song for myself, I did love hearing and seeing how much he was enjoying it, and experiencing the joy of the repetition with him made the whole thing seem new to me again, and I found myself delighting in his experimentation with the form. In a move that surprised myself (and even more my spouse) I was so entertained by how entertained he was, that I taught him "The Song that Never Ends" as well. A week later, on our way back home, I had all four children in the car with me, and after the one- and three-year-old's had surrendered to the siren call of car

naps on the highway, our seven year old took it upon himself to teach our five year old the songs I had taught him.

Folks, my mind was blown. For two hours, on a long and boring car ride, those two siblings sat in the third row of the van and worked on those two songs, singing them in unison, making them call-and-response, trying out different lyrical adjustments, and just playing with the concept of circular songs. I have known these circular songs for many many years. And in all of that knowing I have forgotten to be amazed or delighted at the potential that lies within a pattern or a structure.

This Advent, and really this whole year, I'm going to do my best to approach the predictable, cyclical life of the church with the excitement of children learning and sharing a new style of song. How can we do this "same old same old" in new ways? How can we, through sharing the patterns we have always known, see them fresh through the eyes of those who are just discovering them?

This may be a year of great excitement and delight at Holy Trinity, or it may just be another year. That choice is ours to make, each of us as individual members, and all of us as a community. This past year we have done several things to engage in listening as a congregation to what God is calling us to do. In January at our annual meeting, the Discernment Team will present a summary of all that work, as well as a new identity statement for us as a congregation to consider and hopefully adopt, from which we can move forward into this coming year and the future beyond with renewed energy and clarified purpose.

There is work to be done and joy to be found in our life together at Holy Trinity! This is indeed the song that never ends. Will you join me in singing it?

WORSHIP LIFE

Whole Wheat Communion Bread

All are welcome to make bread for communion here at Holy Trinity. Here is the recipe we use. This recipe is courtesy of Jay Rochelle and takes less than 45 minutes from start to finish.

Ingredients:

- 1 ½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup white flour
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 34 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 heaping teaspoons oil
- 34 cup cold water
- 3 tablespoons molasses or honey or a mixture

Mix dry ingredients. Add oil and blend well. Add water and honey/molasses and mix. Knead about 2 minutes. Flour pastry board/sheet and hands. Hand knead first until dough does not stick to surface. With floured rolling pin, roll out to ¼ inch Cut or hand-form into 6-7-inch rounds (making 3-4 flat loaves). Bake about 15 minutes at 350° on an ungreased cookie sheet.



Blue is the color of Advent—a symbol of hope. Think of a deep, bottomless, and rich blue. Advent's blue is the velvety dark blue of the latenight sky of dawn, the luminous blue of blessed Mary's robes in icons and late medieval and Renaissance paintings, the eternal blue of a winter sky after days of overcast, and the blue of immense



ocean. Our banners remind of us action verbs from the lessons of Advent.

The Advent wreath Lutheran in origin and is a beautiful symbol of the season. Here we see a circle of life, the circle of eternity,

the circle of return, and the hope of renewal. The evergreen boughs in the ring proclaim life, even in winter's cold and dearth of light.

Advent is not a time of waiting for Jesus to be born. The Latin *adventus* is the equivalent of the Greek parousia: coming, presence. The coming of advent is not some past event fondly recalled that we then pretend to wish to come. It is the very real inbreaking of future and past into the present here. It challenges us to envision God's future and live it as a present reality. Advent does not mean wishing; advent means coming. "God with us"the God who was, who is and who is to come.

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

Each week in advent, we light another candle on the advent wreath as we anticipate the coming of Christ, our Savior. Each week in Sunday morning worship,



we need a few people to lead the advent prayer and light the candles on the advent wreath. See the signup sheet, contact the office or speak to Pastor Irwin if you'd like to help.

The Moravian Star



The Moravian Star that will shine over the altar is a gift from Steve and Evelyn Oberndorf. The first Moravian star was made in the Moravian settlement at Niesky, Germany, about 1850. It is a

reminder of the star that led the Magi from their home in the east to Bethlehem, where they presented gifts to the Christ Child. The Risen Christ, likewise, proclaimed himself as "the bright and morning star." It will shine from Advent through Epiphany.

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God. -Ephesians 2:8a

True confessions: I've never worn that jaunty Christmas tie my son bought me five years ago. At the end of every December I shake my head and say, well, maybe next year. It's a waste, I know. Most of us have a few Christmas presents, given in love and received with joy, that are forlornly collecting dust in a drawer or closet. That's not very good stewardship, is it?

More important than that forgotten bottle of perfume or homely sweater, how are you stewarding that most precious of all Christmas gifts—the new life you have through faith in Jesus? Do you cherish it, honor it, make the most of all it has to offer? Because it is truly amazing.

New life. Too many Christians focus exclusively on the AFTERlife that begins when we die. But that's missing out on the joy, peace and fulfillment that Jesus promises us today, what he describes as life abundant. You've doubtless seen evidence of this life in the cheerful eyes and peaceful smiles of holy people you've encountered. Light and love and joy radiates from them.

I want that life. Don't you?

The abundant life is Jesus' free gift, but it doesn't come automatically. It grows with us as we mature in faith through prayer, scripture study, worship, service and generosity – the disciplines of faith. In so doing, we align our hearts and souls with God's purposes and fulfill ever more closely those two holy commandments to love God and neighbor.

This year, don't let your faith end up like a jaunty Christmas tie, hanging unused in the closet. Make the most of it and live into the new, abundant life Jesus promises to us all. It's the number one stewardship lesson.
